The Kerikeri High School Jazz Band, and "Diminished 5th" travelled to Tauranga for the National Youth Jazz Festival at the end of Term 1. The Kerikeri High School Jazz Band won an impressive "Best performance of a New Zealand Work" composed by Mr Alex Ward. "Diminished 5th" was awarded "Most Innovative Band" and individual Awards were presented to **Gillian Toala** Top Clarinet of the Festival and **James Dawes** "Best Arrangement" and "Best Composition."

Kerikeri High School's application to the YRE Litter Less Grant scheme has been successful. The Grant is for a total of \$500.00 which will go towards our first recycling bin to be designed by students to benefit our school.

During the holiday break, we had 55 students, 44 of them who were Gateway students, complete courses here at school. 15 students completed a Comprehensive First Aid Certificate, 20 completed a two day Health and Safety Course and 20 students completed the learning, and then passed their Learners Drivers Licence.

A GUIDE TO WORK DAY FOR PARENTS

THURSDAY 16 MAY 2019

Work Day is our school's major fundraising event of the year. The proceeds from Work Day contribute to extra facilities at our school for which we are not funded. For example, in previous years, Work Day funds have been spent on the provision of filtered water drinking fountains, covered walkways, the new school van, extra seating for the Auditorium for school assemblies, portable marquees, puipui for kapa haka, a garage for the school vans, landscaping and seating at the Hospitality building and the purchase of COW (Computers on Wheels) to facilitate learning in classrooms. The decision about what to spend Work Day funds on, is made by the students via the Student Council.

We ask that you please support this important event in our school calendar by encouraging your child or children to find suitable employment for Thursday 16 May 2019.

Expectations

All students are expected to work on Work Day and find jobs for themselves.

Students will be issued with Work Day cards in the first week of Term 2.

Years 7 and 8 are expected to earn \$15, Years 9 and 10 \$20 and Years 11, 12 and 13 \$25.

School is open for instruction; however, teachers will be participating in Teacher Professional Development and students will be given work to complete under supervision of a reliever.

On the week following Work Day, students will be expected to return their Work Day money, or a note explaining their absence on Work Day, or be considered absent without leave and face normal school consequences if they have done neither of these.

Rewards

There is a free mufti day for all students who have met the expected requirements by **Monday 27 May**.

Students who return money within the timeframe will go in a draw for \$25.00 vouchers (one per each year level).

Class prizes are also awarded. There is a fish and chip lunch for the first junior and senior class with all their money in. There is also a Beach Day for the class returning the highest percentage of money received.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

- Can we work on a different day – e.g Saturday and have Friday off?
Yes, as long as students return Work Day money.
- Do we have to bring all money earned?
Yes. It is illegal to work for payment during a school day, so all money should come to the school as a donation.
- What will students coming to school do?
Students will be provided with work and be supervised by relieving teachers.
- What happens if it is wet?
If the weather is very bad Work Day will be postponed. This will be on the Radio Cancellations and will be posted on our Kerikeri News site and on our App. Students will need to contact their employer.

Measles Fact Sheet

- Measles is a highly infectious viral illness spread by contact with respiratory secretions through coughing and sneezing
- Symptoms of measles include:
 - A respiratory type of illness with dry cough, runny nose, headache
 - Temperature over 38.5 C and feeling very unwell
 - A red blotchy rash starts on day 4-5 of the illness usually on the face and moves to the chest and arms.
- People are infectious from five days before the onset of the rash to five days after the rash starts.
- **Infected persons should stay in isolation – staying home from school or work – during this time.**
- The best protection from measles is to have two MMR vaccinations. MMR is available from your general practice and is free to eligible persons.
- People are considered immune if they have received two doses of MMR vaccine, have had a measles illness previously, or were born before 1969.
- Anyone believing they have been exposed to measles or exhibiting symptoms should not go to the ED or after hours' clinic or general practitioner. Instead call Healthline free on 0800 611 116 for advice and information from a trusted registered nurse, anytime, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

How you get it

Measles virus is highly contagious. It is spread through the air by infected droplets or by direct contact with secretions from the nose or throat of infected persons, for example by touching contaminated items or surfaces. It can survive for up to two hours in the air. A person with measles is most contagious from when symptoms start until three to four days after the rash appears.

Anyone who has not received at least one dose of a measles-containing vaccine or who has not already had the disease is at risk of catching measles.

Symptoms and treatment

It usually takes 10-12 days from exposure to the first symptom. The illness begins with fever, cough, runny nose and conjunctivitis (inflammation in the eyes), which lasts for 2-4 days. It may be possible to see small white spots (Koplik spots) inside the mouth. A rash appears 2-4 days after the first symptoms, beginning at the hairline and gradually spreading down the body to the arms and legs. The rash lasts for up to one week.

There is no specific antiviral treatment for measles. Supportive care including rest, good nutrition, vitamin A supplements, painkillers and adequate fluid intake, including hospital care when needed, can help to manage severe complications.



and Greetings Parents & Whānau members!**

Your son or daughter is being invited to take part in Youth'19 –Survey of the Health and Wellbeing of NZ Secondary School Students.

A sample of students from Years 9-13 will be selected at random to take part in this survey, and your son or daughter might be one of those selected.

This information pamphlet is to inform you as a parent and or whānau about the Youth'19 Survey and you are encouraged to discuss the survey with your son or daughter.

If you do not want your son or daughter to participate in the Youth'19 Survey please contact the school office within two weeks of receiving this brochure and the school liaison person for the survey will remove their name from the list of students who have been selected to take part in the survey.

What is the Youth'19 Survey for?

The aim of the survey is to get reliable and up-to-date information on the health and wellbeing of young people in New Zealand. Basically, we want to find out what young people in New Zealand are really like and how well they are doing.

This information will help to improve health services and programmes for young people.

More than 50 secondary schools throughout the Auckland, Northland and Waikato regions have agreed to take part in the survey, which will involve approximately 8,300 students altogether .

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Who is running the Youth'19 Survey?

The Youth'19 Survey is organised by a team of researchers from The University of Auckland, Victoria University and AUT.

The lead researchers are Dr Terryann Clark and Dr Terry Fleming.

What will the Youth'19 Health and Wellbeing Survey involve?

The survey will be done during school time and will take about 45 minutes to complete.

The students selected will be invited to take part in the survey. They are free to choose whether or not they wish to take part. Students consent to take part in the survey on internet tablets used for the survey.

Those students who agree to take part will complete a questionnaire about themselves and about issues affecting their health and wellbeing. Topics covered are: ethnic identity and culture, family relationships, school, injuries and violence, health and healthcare, emotional health, food and eating, leisure activities, sexual health, alcohol, smoking and other drugs, and community involvement.

The survey program is designed to not ask questions about sensitive topics that do not apply to the particular student (such as sexual health or drug use). For example, all students will be asked if they have ever smoked a cigarette, but only those who answer 'yes' will be asked any further questions about smoking. For those who answer 'no' the program will skip to the next topic. This means that students will not be asked detailed questions about things that they have no direct experience with.

The survey is set up to be private and anonymous. Students answer the questions on internet tablets. Each student will have their own computer and can read the questions off the computer screen and also hear them through headphones. They answer questions by choosing the appropriate responses on the screen.

What if my son or daughter doesn't want to do the survey or answer the questions?

Taking part in the survey is voluntary – we hope the students will agree to take part but they don't have to.

Students who take part can decline to answer any question, or can withdraw from the survey at any time.

What will happen to the information from the Youth'19 Health and Wellbeing Survey?

The answers from each student are transferred automatically to a central computer database. No names or addresses are recorded with this information.

The combined results from this school will be summarised in a confidential report for the school principal.

In this report and all reports of results from the survey we will take care to ensure that no individual student can be identified or even guessed at from the results.

When the whole survey of 60 schools is complete the combined results will be analysed and reports prepared on particular aspects. These reports will be available on our website <https://www.youth19.ac.nz/>

The information students give us is very valuable. We will store it in a pass-word protected computer database at the University of Auckland. It will be kept so that we can compare the results from the Youth'19 survey with those from earlier surveys and surveys that we plan to do in the future.

Is the survey private? Will anyone know what said by any student?

The internet tablets the students will use for the survey are small, so that no one else will be able to see what answers they are giving.

No names will be recorded and the results will be combined so that no-one – not even the researchers – will know what answers any particular student might have given to any of the questions. This means that we cannot withdraw the data of any particular student once they have answered the questions, even if they asked us to do so.

How is Youth'19 funded?

The survey is funded from the Health Research Council of New Zealand.

Kerikeri High School Representative Hoodie Criteria

Kerikeri High School Representative Hoodies are available for students who meet the schools approved criteria, as described below. These hoodies are not part of the official school uniform, as they are subject to fading if worn regularly, and so are not suitable as a permanent uniform item. Students are currently permitted to wear their approved Kerikeri High School hoodies at school however.

The intention of the hoodies is to provide students who represent the school and meet the hoodie criteria with a comfortable and appropriate casual garment that they can wear to mid-week and weekend school sports fixtures, and qualifying Four Cornerstone events.

The school reserves the right to review and amend the criteria for Representative Hoodies as needed.

To qualify for a Representative Kerikeri High School Hoodie students will:

- be in a selected team which represents the school on a regular basis– this can include individual sports, eg Athletics, Tennis etc if the students represent the Kerikeri High School at Northland Secondary Schools Association or National events .
- or be involved in a Four Cornerstone activity representing the school on a regular basis, in a selected group or individual activity. This can include Debating, Kapa Haka, Jazz Band, Rock Quest, Student Librarian, Student Council

All Representative Hoodies must have at least one qualifying Four Cornerstone activity listed under the school logo.

Subsequent qualifying activities may be added to the Representative Hoodie over time, with a formal letter from the school approving the addition(s).

New Representative Hoodies may have qualifying Four Cornerstone activities added retrospectively with formal written approval from the school.

The Representative Hoodies will have the students initials heatpressed on to the back right of the hoodie.

The embroidery of Representative Hoodies is included in the cost of the garment, and Representative Hoodies will not be distributed to students without the relevant details included on them.

Hoodies are purchased on the understanding they are unique to the purchasing student and are not transferable to siblings, friends etc.

Hoodies must be ordered through the Kerikeri High School Sports Office.

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
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
