Kia ora koutou

Our thoughts, condolences and aroha are with whānau and the Whangarei Boys High School community at this tragic time, and we acknowledge their loss and grief.

We have had a strong start to Term 2 and there is a positive and vibrant feel around the school. Learning is happening in classrooms and students are actively engaged. School winter sports codes are underway, and Drama performances are happening. Academic opportunities such as the Otago Mathematics Competition, Mathex, Lit Quiz and Impromptu Speeches are being offered and as you will see later in this Newsletter, a wide range of students are participating and experiencing opportunities across the Four Cornerstones.

I was privileged to attend Te Tai Tokerau Tōkihi ki Tua, our regional Kapa Haka Festival and Competition on Saturday to support our roopū, Te Pou o Manakō. It was a significant occasion and our roopū were outstanding. It was one of those special school moments that fills me with pride. I want to acknowledge and thank them for their commitment, role modelling, and for representing us so strongly. I would also like to acknowledge our hard-working staff, and our alumni and whānau who supported these efforts. We will share confirmed results in our next Newsletter.

I am also enjoying getting out and supporting our students. Saturdays at the Netball Centre, and on the side-line during mid-week winter sport are highlights, and I make every effort to get myself to various fixtures. Please feel free to make yourself known to me as we support our teams and athletes. My thanks also to all the parent and student volunteers who help make sport happen by offering time to coach, referee and umpire.

A word about the importance of regular school attendance.

The irony of highlighting the importance of regular school attendance while we are experiencing ongoing industrial action and loss of learning time is not lost on me. There is no question that rostering of Year Levels home is disruptive, as is today's nation-wide rolling strike. Resolution of the Secondary Teachers Collective Employment Contract sits with PPTA and the Ministry of Education, through their ongoing negotiation and mediation in Wellington.

Day to day, regular school attendance is something we can have an impact on. Regular school attendance is when a student misses less than a week of school a term. There is a growing amount of research and evidence that highlights the importance of regular school attendance. Missing even a week of school a term quickly adds up; a student who misses a week of school every term will have missed a full year of education by the time they turn 16. Regular school attendance is a key driver of academic success, positive wellbeing and positive lifelong outcomes.

We are working on ways in which we can keep you regularly updated about your child's attendance rate, so that you are informed and aware. If your child is away from school for any reason, please let us know as soon as possible by contacting Te Puna Waiora or using the school app.

We strongly encourage you to do everything you can at home to reinforce with your children the importance of coming to school, being in class and being positively and actively engaged in their learning.

Our attendance rates have improved significantly in Term 1 this year compared to last year. In Term 2 2022, average attendance dropped as low as 72% across the school. In Term 1 2023 it was 85% across the school. Regular attendance is 90% and above.

Congratulations to the 13 students who competed against 400 other riders at the North Island Mountain Bike Championships in Rotorua during the April holidays. Four Kerikeri High School teams of three junior students competed in the Agrikids Competition on Saturday 29th April. They were very keen contestants and are all keen to do it again next year.



Congratulations to all the members of the Kerikeri High School Sailing squad after a great term of sailing.

The Keelboat Team qualified for the gold fleet event at the Nationals sailed on the Waitemata Harbour in Elliott 7s.

The Sailing Team was successful at the Regional Championships in Parua Bay, tying on points with a very strong Rangitoto team.

The Sailing Team also finished a credible 10th out of 28 teams at the National Championships at Algies Bay last month. Special mention goes to

Charley Cates (Year 13), the Team Captain, who is in his last year with the team. Charley has held this team together over the years and has inspired a new generation of young sailors who all aspire to try and beat him on the racecourse.



KERI Reading

Tuesday 2 May marked the 22nd year of KERI Reading with a formal and fun event to match up 34 trained Year 13 Tutors and their KERI Readers. The KERI in KERI Reading stands for Kiwis Enjoying Reading Interaction. The aim of this programme is for Year 7 students to have an enjoyable, shared reading experience with Year 13 students, to encourage our Year 7 students to read more. This programme was developed in 2001 by a group of students as a Community Problem Solving project and went on to win National and International awards. It has remained very successful in our school for both the Year 13s and the Year 7s.

Year 13 students volunteer to be KERI Reading Tutors and to work with a Year 7 student in Terms 2 and 3 for one of their study periods each week. This year 34 Year 13 students have volunteered to be tutors and work with Year 7 students, and we thank them for their commitment and service.

Attitude Day 16th May 2023

Attitude is a team of talented communicators who are passionate about the wellbeing of young people. Since the mid-1990s Attitude presenters have been informing, inspiring and entertaining students across New Zealand. The topics covered for each year level are outlined below.

Year 9 - Holistic Wellbeing

We introduce the concept of holistic wellbeing and look at the physical, mental, spiritual, and social sides to every teenager. This programme gives young people ideas on how to tackle their teenage years and become the best version of themselves.

Year 10 - Drugs, Alcohol, and Peer Pressure

We address the issues that cause people to make poor decisions, and give ideas on how to assess risks, make better decisions, deal with peer pressure, and overcome addictions.

Year 11 - Choices, Resilience, and Self-esteem

This presentation offers practical advice on how to get through the hard chapters of life and delivers the 'life messages' teenagers need to grow mental and emotional resilience. It covers the importance of making positive decisions, and how to build the four cornerstones of a meaningful life.

Year 12 - Building and Maintaining Healthy Relationships.

This is a guide to building and maintaining healthy relationships, offering ideas on dealing with peer pressure and coping with break-ups.

Year 13 - Mental Wellbeing

This is a basic overview of how the brain works and a survival kit for handling stress, depression, and the tough times in life. This presentation aims to normalise common mental health issues and give practical solutions of how to get help.

Pink Shirt Day

This year our National Pink Shirt Day is on Friday 19th May. This day is to promote our anti-bullying messages, celebrate diversity, and promote inclusiveness, kindness, and aroha. Our Student WAKA group has taken this project on with huge enthusiasm. It is exciting to see our Year 11's building confidence, having settled into their first year as senior students.

Year 11 students are now well underway with their NCEA Level One studies, completing internally assessed Achievement Standards over the range of their subjects. We have started to see the credits appear in students' individual Records of Achievement in our Student Management System. Please remember to ask your child to log on at home with you regularly. This is a great way for you to keep involved in their academic progress. We strongly encourage our students to be fully informed about their learning, so if you are concerned that your child does not really understand the expectations of NCEA Level One, please encourage them to have a chat with their Form Teacher.

Assessment work will increase this term and students will need to manage multiple deadlines by taking responsibility for their own learning. Consistent attendance avoids gaps and keeps the learning momentum going. Arriving at every class on time, keeping track of deadlines on a calendar and keeping ahead of deadlines will also be useful. Homework tends to be focussed on assessment work in Year 11, so there is always study work that can be done at home to support progress in class.

This term, Year 11 Form Teachers are working with their classes on setting up good study habits and skills, building student awareness of how they work best, and how to best use their study time. Students can make the most of their Form Teachers' support during Form Times and Tutorial on Tuesdays. Please ensure your child arrives at school before form time every day.
