Dear Parents, Whānau, Staff and Students

We chose to hold last week's Newsletter back following the tragic passing of our Year 12 student Ashleigh Bourne, out of respect to her family and friends. Our thoughts and aroha have been and are with Ashleigh's family and friends at this difficult time.

Last week was a tough one for many of our students and staff. We have offered students and teachers support and time as they come to terms with their loss and deal with their grief. We will continue to do all we can for everyone who has been affected by Ashleigh's passing in the coming weeks and months.

These tragic circumstances always bring the best out in our Kerikeri community and remind us all how closely connected we are. Saturday's service for Ashleigh was a sad occasion but also a wonderful celebration of a life lived to the full. It was uplifting to hear her family and friends speak so genuinely and emotionally about her.

Last week also saw the announcement of further industrial action by members of the PPTA, with an increase to the rostering home schedule they have initiated. This is an an unsatisfactory situation for everyone. It's fair to say there are two sides to this situation and I know everyone will be hoping the two sides can quickly find common ground and agreement on the terms and conditions of the Secondary Teachers Collective Contract, to end the disruption to student learning and of course to families.

A feature of life at Kerikeri High School is being able to be actively involved in a wide variety of activities. Our students understand this as our Four Cornerstones philosophy, which aims to give them the opportunity to participate and experience success across a diverse range of Academic, Cultural, Sporting and Leadership opportunities. A look at our school calendar over the last few weeks illustrates how much is on offer for our students, and we actively encourage them to get involved in as many opportunities as they can.

Being involved in the wider life of the school, being active, being busy and being engaged creates a strong sense of belonging. We know that the busier our students are, the more successful they are. I also believe that a strong sense of healthy wellbeing is developed when young people are positively engaged in activities they enjoy. We continue to encourage our students to participate widely in school life; they may discover a hidden talent.

I thank all our teachers and staff, parent coaches and managers, and our student coaches and umpires for their commitment and contribution across the Four Cornerstones. Over the coming weeks I encourage parents and students to take a moment and acknowledge those people who enable these opportunities to happen and say thanks. It's a small gesture that goes a long way and means a lot.

It was great to see so many students and staff embrace Pink Shirt Day on Friday 19 May. Pink Shirt Day celebrates diversity and our strong anti-bullying message. We know that sometimes things go wrong between people, and when this happens our message to our students is to always tell a safe adult. A parent, a Year Level Dean, a Form Teacher, a subject teacher, a Guidance Counsellor, an Assistant or Deputy Principal - we are here to help and will do everything we can to support students through any difficult or upsetting situations. PPTA Industrial Action

On Friday we received notification from the Post Primary Teachers Association (PPTA) of further and ongoing industrial action, beginning today. As you can see from the timeline below, the union has intensified strike action with an increase in the schedule of rostering home of students. This is unwelcome news for many of us.

I am very conscious of the impact this has on our families and on our students, and I am very disappointed the situation has reached this point. There will be a range of views across our community about the action the PPTA are taking. These industrial decisions are not decisions made by Kerikeri High School. Industrial bargaining around the terms of the Secondary Teachers Collective agreement occurs between the Ministry of Education and the Executive members of the PPTA, and PPTA members nationwide have voted to take this action in response to the pay and condition offers made to Secondary Teachers by the Ministry of Education.

Our priority for our students will be their wellbeing. For our students in Years 11, 12 and 13 we are looking hard at how we can restructure teaching and learning programmes, and subsequent NCEA assessments, to minimise student stress and anxiety and the impact on them of compressing assessment timeframes.

Students without a permission note from home will remain at school and be supervised. Normal classes can not run.

Year 12 Drama





Joe Howells Head Boy

What can you tell us about your journey through Kerikeri High School?

What can you tell us about your journey through Kerikeri High School?

I would say to my younger self to not slack off and to be a good example to my friends and others around me.

What are your plans and goals for life after school?

My plan after school is to work to gain a Basketball scholarship and to pursue my dream to continue playing basketball at higher levels. I want to attend university and study Sports Science, to continue to stay around basketball and sports even when I am not playing. Another goal is to travel and gain lifelong experiences by being around different cultures other than my own.
