#### **Principal's Message**

#### Kia ora koutou

Last week our Board of Trustees began their consultation with our school community as part of their work developing a new Strategic Plan that will guide Kerikeri High School through the next two years. This is part of the Ministry of Education's new Planning and Reporting processes for all schools in New Zealand. This consultation gives our parents and whānau an opportunity to give feedback on what we are doing well and what we could do better, and to help shape what our school will look like moving forward.

We genuinely want to hear from you, and we value your honest feedback and thoughts. Please take a few moments to complete the survey which was emailed to all parents and whānau last week to ensure your voice is heard.

I am pleased to report we are also underway with our work with the Education Review Office and their new 'Te Ara Huarau' process, which is a new review process replacing the previous model which saw ERO onsite for three days, and then publishing a report. The new process involves us working with ERO to set and monitor goals over the coming three years and is a longer-term collaboration. The Education review Office's next meeting with us is Tuesday 24 October.

I have spoken about attendance in previous newsletters, and I continue to stress the importance for our students of regular attendance. I appreciate we are experiencing a lot of illness in the community, but I remain concerned about students whose attendance is irregular and their academic progress. Every day at school and every hour in class counts.

Some families are choosing to take overseas holidays and trips during the school term, and while this may mean access to cheaper flights and accommodation, there is a cost and that will be to student learning and progress. It is difficult for teachers to be providing up to a month and in some cases six weeks' worth of work in advance for students on holiday and overseas trips. Their planning priority is for the students who are present in their classes daily.

Once again you will see in the Student Achievement section of this newsletter the wide and diverse range of student achievement across the Four Cornerstones. As we write references for our Year 13 students who are applying for University Scholarships, the depth and breadth of their participation in school life across their time with us becomes apparent. There is a lot to be proud of.



# **Visiting Music Mentor**

This year we were successful in our application to the New Zealand Music Commission to have a Mentor visit the Music Department for two days. Kim Halliday is a professional musician from Auckland who specialises in Guitar but also plays a range of instruments and writes compositions to go with documentaries and film. She worked with many option music students who were preparing for their Solo Performances later in the term. In addition to that, she talked about working within the music industry with the Year 13 students, answered questions and offered advice to those thinking about heading that way when they finish school. Kim had an opportunity to work with two focused groups of guitarists - an advanced group of Year 11-13 males and an enthusiastic group of Year 8-10 girls. The girls made an impression and were invited back for an additional session before Kim left. Thank you to the New Zealand Music Commission for providing this wonderful opportunity to our students and to Kim for her wisdom, insight and patience.

# **School Buses Update**

Our local school bus network is known as KSTN (Kerikeri Schools Transport Network) and includes Kerikeri High School, Kerikeri Primary School, Riverview School and Oromahoe School.

In 2021 the KSTN requested a review of the funding for our local bus routes by the Ministry of Education. After a long and somewhat frustrating wait, the Ministry has now completed the review.

We are pleased to share with you that because of this review there is an increase to KSTN funding which allows us to make some additions to our bus routes and allows us to carry students who were previously not eligible for Transport Assistance.

We are now able to carry students who live outside the KSTN boundaries. (Unfortunately, and somewhat confusingly, the transport boundaries do not coincide with Enrolment Zone boundaries).

For clarity on who is eligible to catch school buses, any student in Years 1 – 8 who lives within 3.2km of their nearest school (whether they attend that school or not) and in Years 9 – 13 who lives within 4.8km of their nearest school (whether they attend that school of not) are ineligible for transport assistance and cannot travel for free on KSTN buses. This is a nationwide Ministry of Education setting, not a local rule KSTN have put in place. All school bus networks across Aotearoa New Zealand operate the same.

From this week students who live beyond the minimum distance described above are now eligible for transport assistance regardless of whether they are attending their nearest school or not. Students who attend a more distant school 'transfer their eligibility' and can use, free of charge, a bus serving the school they attend. The only requirement is that they catch the bus from a scheduled stop on the shortest route between their home and their school.

If you reside closer to another school which offers Year 7 & 8, or Years 9 - 13 and you wish to make use of one of the KSTN buses, please contact our friendly staff at Reception to check eligibility and which bus and stop your child may be able to use.

Students who are using KSTN buses and who are now eligible by transfer will no longer need to pay. Contact us at Reception for details on refunds for concession cards.

The privately operated buses serving Paihia, Haruru, Kaeo, Kaikohe etc which are outside the KSTN boundaries are still fare paying routes.

The additional funding may also be used in the future to allow for some extra routes or bus runs, to alleviate the loadings on some buses, and we will assess that once we understand the impact of the changes described above.

At this stage, the Network schools have considered the best use of the increase and have resolved that the following improvements to routes will be introduced.

#### Initially two Routes will be extended

The current KK14 route will extend to cover 340-560 Wiroa Rd and 0-230 Lodore Rd (Ricker Rd corner) collecting students for Kerikeri Primary School and Kerikeri High School.

The current KK6 bus will extend its route to include 700-410 Puketona Rd (terminus will be in Halyard Loop, Watea).

Moving forward, KSTN will monitor student numbers on our buses and may subsequently introduce a new route that will serve the northern and central area of our network. This will involve some considerable alteration to current routes and full details will be provided for everyone before any introduction.

#### Timing of these changes

The extensions to KK14 and KK6 are planned to occur in the week of 4 - 8 September. There will be minor adjustments to bus times in the order of 5-10 minutes. There may be some further minor adjustments required over the initial days of operation. Students will be given details of these. The introduction of any new northern and central route will probably be during Term 4 after monitoring of student loadings.

#### A Safety Reminder

The Ministry of Education have requested that schools "remind your caregivers that it is their responsibility to supervise their children prior to the children boarding the school bus in the morning and once they get off the school bus in the afternoon."

This is a timely reminder that schools are not responsible for student safety at bus stops, other than the loading and unloading procedures.

Please also remember that schools and our roads are extremely busy before and after school, and sometimes younger students are not as aware of road safety as we would like. Please drive carefully and stick to speed limits outside schools and when passing stationary buses collecting or dropping off

students. The speed limit when passing a stationary school bus is 20km an hour.

# Cobham Road Roadworks 4 September – 30 November

We have been advised today that there will be major roadworks taking place on Cobham Road beginning 4 September and scheduled to finish on 30 November. An upgrade of the public wastewater system will mean Cobham Road will be reduced to one lane with traffic flow controlled by traffic lights. This will be between the intersection of Mill Land and Cobham Road and Resolution Road and Cobham Road. We anticipate this will cause considerable disruption and urge everyone to include likely delays in your morning and afternoon planning.
