
Daffodil Day 2023

WAKA For Phones

A reminder that our expectations for student management of their phones at school includes that all phones are either switched off or on silent, and in school bags during class time. Students should not be listening to music during lessons and phones are to be left in school bags if a student leaves class for any reason, for example to go to the toilet.



Please support your child by reinforcing these expectations, and if your child is having their behaviour addressed because they are not meeting our expectations, perhaps support them by making them leave their phone at home.
