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Principal's Message

Kia ora koutou

A very warm welcome back to everyone for the start of Term 4. For our students in Years 11, 12 and 13 this term is a sprint – we only have three school weeks remaining before our Elite Senior Prizegiving (Wednesday 1 November). For our students in Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 it's not quite a sprint, I liken it more to the 800 metres – hard and fast work with the end of the school year somewhat in sight. As always Term 4 will be extremely busy across the school.

Our Elite Senior Prizegiving on Wednesday 1 November at 11.30am will be a special highlight as we acknowledge and celebrate the exceptional performance and achievement of so many of our Year 11, 12 and 13 students across the Four Cornerstones, and most especially the Academic Cornerstone. We extend a warm invitation to all parents, whānau, caregivers and friends of the School to this special occasion. Because Senior Prizegiving involves all of our staff, normal classes will not run that day for students in Years 7, 8, 9 and 10, and students in those year levels who come to school that day will be supervised by our relief teachers.

A major change we have been working on this year has come to fruition, and this term we will begin issuing our new look, and more regular school reports. This has been a development in response to feedback from parents and whānau, as well as staff, and we believe the new and more regular reporting process and format will give parents more up to date information about ongoing learning progress, attendance, and attitude to learning. For students in Year 11, 12 and 13 we realise the timing of introducing these new reports to parents is not ideal, however, we believe the benefits will quickly become apparent as we move forward next year. These new reports will be issued twice in Term 1, and three times in Terms 2, 3 and 4.

We will share more information and a guide to our new reports with all parents, whānau and caregivers within the next week, in advance of Senior Reports being issued.

You may recall from our Newsletter of 3 August that we signalled our Year 10 students will be entered for the Literacy and Numeracy co-requisite credits which are required to 'unlock' NCEA at Level 1 and beyond. By way of a reminder, these assessments, known as co-requisites, will see students required to achieve 10 Literacy (Reading and Writing) and 10 Numeracy co-requisite credits. These 20 co-requisite credits sit outside the 60 NCEA credits which make up a Level 1 NCEA qualification from 2024. Students will achieve these co-requisite credits through sitting three assessments in Reading, Writing, and Numeracy. These tests are completed on-line, and all of our Year 10 students will be sitting these in the week beginning Monday 30 October.

These co-requisite credits have attracted a lot of media comment in the last 12 months or so, and we are aware that results have varied across the country for all sorts of reasons. We are also aware some students may not achieve these credits in their first attempt. However, there is no requirement to attain them in Year 10, and students will have successive opportunities to unlock them as they progress through Years 11, 12 and 13. For those who do attain them, they will have kick-started their NCEA journey.

Thank you to everyone who completed our Board of Trustees survey last term. Your feedback is invaluable, and we are grateful for your time, thought and honesty. Your feedback will play an important part in shaping the strategic planning for our school moving forward, and our Board will share that with our school community in the coming months.

SchoolDocs sites are organised into sections that reflect operational requirements. The table of contents shows the key policy for each section, with dropdown menus that show supporting policies and procedures.

All SchoolDocs schools follow a 3-year review schedule that ensures content stays up to date. Each term, the school community is able to provide feedback on the content and implementation of policies and procedures that are under review.

Measles Case in Northland: Awareness for Families and Caregivers

As you may have read in the media, someone from Northland has recently been diagnosed with measles. The local public health service is in the process of tracing any exposed contacts from this case within Northland.

At this time, we are uncertain about the source of this infection, and there may be other cases of measles in our community.

The public health service will advise any organisation where there has been an exposure to measles, and if needed, these will be publicised through media alerts.

Over the next few weeks, we ask that parents and caregivers please take note of the signs and symptoms of measles.

Measles is infectious, so if you or your whānau develop any of these symptoms, please phone your doctor or after-hours clinic before attending. You can also ring Healthline on 0800 611 116 for advice anytime; interpreters are available.

Measles key signs and symptoms

- The illness often begins with fever, cough, runny nose and conjunctivitis (pink, watery and sore eyes), which can last for 2-4 days.
- A red and spotty rash then appears 2-4 days after the first symptoms, beginning at the hairline and gradually spreading down the body to the arms and legs. The rash lasts for up to one week.



The factsheet included provides more information about measles. MMR vaccination provides excellent protection against measles, which can be a serious illness.
