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## Principal's Message

Kia ora koutou

As we reach the end of a busy and shorter-than-usual Term 1, it is timely to reflect on what has been a fast-paced, positive and productive start to the year. We have certainly packed a lot in.

This term we welcomed and inducted over 370 new students to Kerikeri High School, including 214 Year 7s, 42 new Year 9s, and 64 new international students.

Our Prefect application, selection and training process was completed, and we were pleased to introduce our Prefects and Head Students to the school community.

We once again ran our popular and highly successful Peer Support Programme for Year 7 students, culminating in Peer Support Camps on Urupukapuka Island. In addition, we held our inaugural Year 9 Camps at Marsden Point Christian Camp, which were a great success and thoroughly enjoyed by students. A sincere thank you to the parent helpers who supported both camps.

Summer sport has been a highlight, with strong participation across codes. We were delighted with the increased engagement in our revamped School Swimming Sports, and significant success at the Northland Secondary Schools Athletics Championships. We had teams representing us during the Secondary Schools Summer Tournament Week 23rd – 27th March and we had outstanding performances at the National Secondary Schools Waka Ama Championship and the National Secondary School Volleyball Championship. As the summer season concludes, our Sports Department has been busy preparing for winter, with football and netball trials now completed.

Te Pou o Manakō represented Kerikeri High School with distinction at the Tai Tokerau Festival held at Kaitiāia College this week. With 60 students on stage, the roopū delivered a stunning bracket full of energy, presence and pride, and set themselves apart. He mihi nui tēnei ki ngā pouako, thank you to our strong team of teachers and tutors who tirelessly support our rangatahi.

We were privileged to support Ngāti Rēhia when they unveiled the Pou Uepoto Te Herenga on Kororipo Pā, Friday 27 March. It was a special moment for all that were able to attend.

Strong numbers of our students have been actively engaged; with our environmental and sustainability group SAVE, with Debating, as Student Librarians, and as Kiwi Buddies for our International students. Our Student WAKA Team is busy planning for our school Anzac Day Commemoration in Term 2.

Most importantly, learning continues every hour of every day. Strong relationships sit at the heart of learning, and we appreciated the large number of parents who attended our recent Whānau Feedback Evening. Unfortunately, the significant weather event last week meant the first evening was postponed. We look forward to welcoming those families on Thursday 23 April.

I would like to commend our teachers for their continued dedication and professionalism. Teaching is a fast-paced and demanding profession, particularly when supporting and educating adolescents, and we are fortunate to have such a high-quality staff.

The education sector is currently experiencing significant, system-wide change, with curriculum and qualification systems both undergoing generational and rapid reform. While there is some uncertainty as changes evolve, please be assured that we remain fully committed to doing the very best for your children and will stay informed and responsive to new requirements.

## Reminder about Lockdown Procedures

In extremely rare circumstances, schools are faced with lockdown situations. Our lockdown processes are carefully designed to keep students and staff safe during situations where there may be a risk on or near the school site.

During a lockdown it is very important that parents and caregivers do not come to the school, as additional movement and people on and around the school can unintentionally increase risk and make it harder for emergency services and school staff to manage the situation safely.

We understand how distressing these moments can be for everyone, however it is often difficult for schools to share detailed information in real time while staff are focused on supervision, safety, and following Police or Ministry guidance. Reassurance and accurate updates are always shared as soon as it is safe and appropriate to do so. Our School App is an important communication tool in these situations - if you have not done so, we encourage you to download the School Apps NZ from your app store and select Kerikeri High School.

Lockdown events are extremely rare, and our procedures are thorough, practised, and designed with student and staff wellbeing at the centre. For parents' awareness, lockdown drills themselves are discouraged, and we instead focus on staff preparedness and calm, age-appropriate communication.

## Schools Onsite Teacher Education Programme

Kerikeri High School has partnered with AUT's School of Education – Te Kura Mātauranga in launching School Onsite teacher education in 2026 with the Graduate Diploma in Secondary Teaching. If you are interested in working alongside our high calibre staff while training to be a Secondary Teacher, there is a mid-year intake for 2026-2027. AUT is an approved provider of School Onsite Training, which provides funding for places in school-based initial teacher education

programmes. It gives student teachers the opportunity to gain practical teaching experience in a host school, while studying towards their teaching qualification. Successful applicants (must be New Zealand Permanent Residents or Citizens) for this programme will be eligible for a \$19,930 bursary.

We are especially interested in applicants for Mathematics, Science, Technology, Hospitality, PE, Te Reo Māori and Te Ao Haka; applications in other subject areas are most welcome.

## Meet the Head Students



### Molly Para Head Girl

#### **What can you tell us about your journey through Kerikeri High School?**

I began my journey at Kerikeri High School in 2022 as a Year 9. Coming from a small, rural school with around 100 students I was immediately overwhelmed by both the abundance of opportunities available to me and the sheer size of our kura. However, those feelings quickly subsided as I found my place within our school and embraced all aspects of the Four Cornerstones. From this I have achieved personal growth, meaningful experiences, new connections, and most importantly, the ability to step out of my comfort zone. This gave me a sense of confidence that would greatly benefit me throughout my time at Kerikeri High School.

#### **What do you enjoy most about your school, and what has been a particular highlight for you?**

For me, one of the best things about school is the endless support from my dedicated teachers. I believe that without the ongoing awhi from my teachers, I would not have achieved everything I have thus far. This unwavering commitment from all of my kaiako has pushed me to succeed at a high level, with my proudest moment to date being chosen by both my peers and teachers as Head Girl. #### **What does great student leadership look like to you and what have you learnt about yourself?**

#### **Knowing what you know now, what message might you give your Year 9 self?**

I would tell Year 9 me to put myself out there and give everything a go! Because I entered high school as a Year 9 instead of a Year 7, it was easy for me to feel disconnected from my peers. Knowing what I know now, I would push younger me into trying things I was too intimidated to try like Kapa Haka. #### **What are your plans and goals for life after school?**

After school, I would like to go to university for a Bachelor of Laws, although the university is undecided. I'd also like to continue my Te Reo Māori journey to hopefully reach fluency and further immerse myself in Te Ao Māori. To me, these goals lay a strong foundation for the kind of impact I want to make in the future.

### **What can you tell us about your journey through Kerikeri High School?**

I've been a student at Kerikeri High School since the very beginning of Year 7. My journey here has been one filled with support and opportunities to grow, and I am so grateful for the range of Cornerstones offered at Kerikeri High School that allow all of us here to become such well-rounded students.

### **Variety Child Sponsorship**
