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Principal's Message

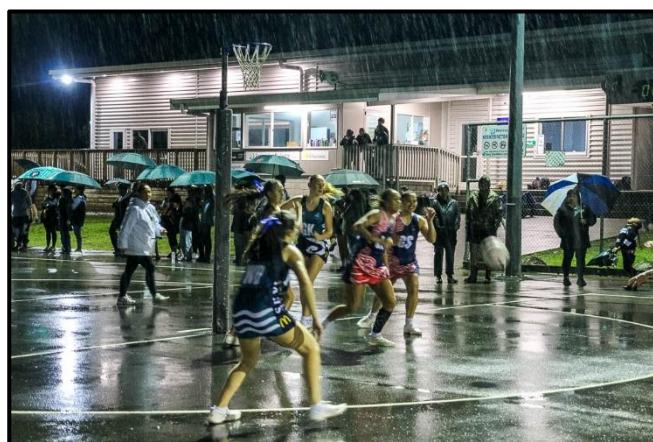

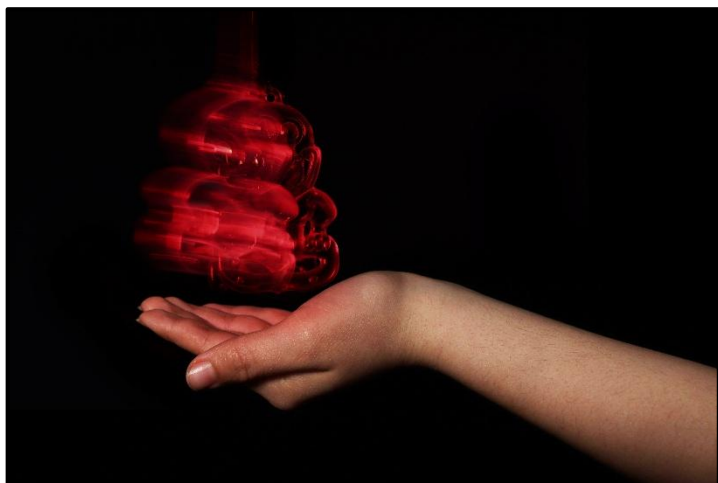

Student Trustee Election

Nominations for Student Trustee on the Kerikeri High School Board of Trustees are now open and close midday on Tuesday 8 September. Voting opens for eligible Year 9 – 13 students on Monday 14 September. Eligible students will be sent instructions and voting information to their student emails.

Voting closes at **4.00pm** on **24 September 2026**.

Year 11 – 13 Mock Examinations

Mock Examinations for Year 11 – 13 students will be taking place from Tuesday 8 September – Wednesday 16 September inclusive. During this time, Year 11 – 13 students will be on study leave, and normal classes will not run for them. Students will only be required at school when they have an examination or assessment scheduled.

The purpose of these examinations is to give students an opportunity to sit practice external assessments in a formal examination setting, complete work towards externally assessed portfolio work, or work on internal assessments if a subject does not have any external assessment.

The grades from these practice assessments may also be used to support derived grade applications at the end of the year should a student either be unable to sit their NCEA examinations or feel that their performance in an examination has been impaired, for reasons beyond their control. More information about derived grades will be provided in Term 4 to students and parents.

Additionally, opportunities for students to complete the new NCEA reading, writing and numeracy assessments are scheduled for students in Years 11 -13 who are yet to meet these requirements.

Morning sessions run from 9.00am – 12.00pm and afternoon sessions from 1.00pm to 4.00pm.

Students should be at school, outside the scheduled room, at least 10 minutes before the start of a session. A study room will be available for students at school for silent study.

Normal classes for Year 11 – 13 students will resume on Thursday 17 September.

These examinations and assessment opportunities are an important part of the year, and we will be supporting students to make the most of this opportunity as they progress through their NCEA qualifications.

Year 10 Literacy and Numeracy Common Assessment Activities

In Weeks 8 and 9 of this term, our Year 10 students have the opportunity to participate in the reading, writing and numeracy Common Assessment Activities (CAAs), which are an important part of the NCEA framework. CAAs are a centrally-developed, and online way for students to demonstrate their literacy and numeracy skills.

The main purpose of the CAAs is to ensure all students have a strong foundation in reading, writing, and mathematics before they move on to more advanced studies. Successfully completing these activities is a co-requisite for achieving any NCEA qualification—Level 1, Level 2, or Level 3. This means that even if a student earns enough credits to pass NCEA, they won't receive their qualification until they have also passed the literacy and numeracy CAAs.

We are offering these assessments to our Year 10 students this year to give them an early opportunity to meet this requirement. If they pass, they won't need to worry about it in future years. If they don't pass, they will have plenty of time and support to prepare for another attempt. These assessments are not pass/fail in the traditional sense; students are simply required to demonstrate their proficiency. The results will be reported as either "Achieved" or "Not Achieved" for each of the three components: reading, writing, and numeracy.

We believe that early engagement with the CAAs will give our students a significant advantage as they transition into the senior school and begin their NCEA journey.

In the People's Choice Awards (chosen by shoppers on the day); **Leah Shrubshall** was voted the winner. **Charlie Rowe** (Year 12) and **Luke Norman** (Year 12) were voted 2nd for their business *Gnarly Co.* which creates branded sunglasses, beanies and caps and **Hayley Foster** (Year 12) was voted 4th. She has created a low sugar recipe book.





Year 13 students **Yoko-Belle Brewis**, **Kiani Hogg**, **Zoe Merlo** and **Koko Rosevear** received the prize (donated by Repco) for Outstanding Customer Service. Their business, *Funky Ferments* creates sauerkraut, kimchi, chilli oil and hummus.

Student Sailing Voyage

The New Zealand Sailing Trust, along with the generosity of the George Hansen Estate, once again offered Kerikeri High School the opportunity to take a group of students on one of Sir Peter Blake's ex international offshore racing yachts.

This year 23 senior students, accompanied by **Mr Andy Willis** and **Miss Katie Batterton**, experienced the five-day voyage on board *Steinlager2*. The voyage took students from Cape Brett and Deepwater Cove to the Whangaroa Harbour. A stopover at the Cavalli Islands on the way back involved a walk on Motukawanui Island, the largest of the Cavalli group. From there it was back to the Bay of Islands with a final night anchored off Roberton Island. Those who were brave enough swam around the boat each morning and some were actually hard to persuade to get out of the wintry water. The weather ranged from sunny and warm to windy rainy and cold.

The students did themselves and Kerikeri High School proud, with skipper Mike Brown praising the students saying what a pleasure it was to share the experience with them.

Seniors earned direct entry as projects were completed outside of class time.

There were many prizes collected by our 65 entrants as the list attached shows. The Outstanding awards and Premier awards as well as the Year level and Overall winner prizes had significant monetary value. The two overall winners had their prize money not split because of the generosity of Top Energy who were very impressed with their efforts.

Redwoods Removal Project

Far North District Council wishes to advise residents that tree removal works will be undertaken on council-owned land at Wendywood Lane, Kerikeri. The work will be carried out by specialist arborist contractor OS Safe Tree Ltd and is part of an important safety programme to reduce the risk posed by a large stand of mature redwood trees during high wind and storm events. Tree removal works will start on Monday 7 September and are expected to be completed by Friday 30 October.

Tree removal works can be a significant safety hazard. OS Safe Tree will be installing safety fencing and safety signage to protect the public. Please stay safe by staying out of the fenced areas and respecting signage.

The pedestrian access along Wendywood Lane will be closed. It is important that students travelling to and from school avoid Wendywood Lane. If your child usually travels to and from school via Wendywood Lane, please discuss alternative routes with your child. Parking, and pickup or drop off of students in Wendywood Lane will not be possible.
